KEY ACTIVITIES

There is no report on a **Forum Day** because the 7th such event was held before our last AGM in 2017 and is reported on in our Annual Report for 2016 - 2017. Our eighth Forum Day is being planned for September, 2018.

ECUMENICAL WALK OF LIGHT, 2017: The DCC is pleased to continue to sponsor this ecumenical event which takes place each year on the last Sunday of the liturgical calendar which fell on 26th November in 2017. As in other years the 13th Walk of Light covered a different route and included different parishes to the previous year. It commenced in Newman University Church on St. Stephen's Green at 4pm. The pilgrims then walked to Methodist Centenary Church in Leeson Park and from there to the final act of worship in St. Mary's Church, Haddington Road, after which the Pilgrim Walkers enjoyed refreshments organised by the parishioners. The theme for 2017, "To and from the mountain", was explored in different ways in each of the three designated church venues but it was also designed as one continuous liturgical unit. The organisers had again timed the worship well but less than 200 participants took part at any one stage. In retrospect both the organisers and the DCC agreed that by not including the south city centre on the walk we missed an opportunity to proclaim Christ as the Light of the World and as our only hope in dark times to many more people.

INAUGURAL SERVICE FOR THE WEEK OF PRAYER FOR CHRISTIAN UNITY is a key ecumenical moment in the greater Dublin area as it brings together the patrons of our various member denominations. The liturgy service is based on that provided by the *Churches Together in Britain and Ireland* and takes place every year on 18th January. In 2018 the theme was "That all may be free", based on the text from Exodus 15:6, *Your right hand, O Lord, glorious in power.* The service was hosted by the parish of the Church of Our Lady of Good Counsel, Johnstown/Killiney. The address was given by Dr. Jessie Rogers from St. Patrick's College, Maynooth in which she explored not only the bondage from which God's people had been set free but what God's people




had been freed for. Moving on through the story of God's People in the Old Testament to those in the New and Biblically challenging us to meet the Risen Lord on the road in our daily lives. "We will meet him in our brothers and sisters of different traditions when we welcome the stranger and work to free the oppressed - together." We are very grateful to Father John Sinnott, the Sacristan, the organist and the all the team of parishioners who helped us prepare before the worship and who offered us hospitality afterwards.

ST. PATRICK'S DAY, 2018 - PATRICK, A STRANGER BEARING GIFTS: The event was again held in St. Patrick's Cathedral on the evening of St. Patrick's Day. The Council decided that it was time to refresh what had been a very successful format for this event. Early in the year the chairperson met with the Dean, Rev. William Morton, the Dean's Vicar and some of the Cathedral staff all of whom were most supportive and encouraging and professed themselves "excited" at what we were proposing to do this year.

A small organising committee prepared a very memorable event which challenged all those present to think long and well about how we treat those who are different to ourselves and to examine ourselves to see how we feel about being strangers in a strange place. It is invidious to pick out individuals but special mention must be made of the creativity of Mariesophie Magnusson, Lutheran ordinand in training on placement in Dublin, who was mainly responsible for the three stations around the cathedral building which very effectively invited viewers in different ways to think about 'Strangers'. Worship was greatly enhanced by David Leigh on the organ and by the Tara Ensemble who travelled from Co. Meath in spite of the forecast of atrocious weather to come later that evening and by the prayers of Intercession led by overseas students from DCU. It was a





great pity that that weather forecast plus the fact that the Irish rugby team had won the rugby Grand Slam that afternoon meant that the attendance was smaller than usual, particularly as Scott Evans, Church of Ireland Lay Chaplain in UCD, preached a sermon that captivated his audience including some very young children who were present. £400 was sent to Spirasi from the door collection.

German Remembrance Day & Seminar, 19th November, 2017. The Seminar with the German Military Bishop was held in the morning in Glencree Reconciliation Centre and was followed in the afternoon with a service in the chapel and at the German Military Cemetery across the road.

Ecumenical Service of Remembrance for the Armenian Genocide, 22nd April, in Christ Church Cathedral.
